





Music Notes

Our Voluntaries today, BWV (JS Bach works catalogue number) 555 and 559 are harmonically and rhythmically rich. Both preludes exude virtuosity. BWV 555, in e minor, demonstrates the composer's ability to travel seamlessly through long series of harmonic changes leaving the impression of movement and abundance. BWV 559, in a minor, is virtuosic in its keyboard figurations. 559 is like a fantasia where musical gestures and flourishes, are set apart with moments of silence to add drama. Both fugues are both constructed with 3 beats in each measure but give very different impressions. 555's fugue subject uses long notes (notes held over many beats) to slow the pace of the music and broadening the scope of the harmonic movement. 559's subject moves in the opposite direction using quick notes (notes played on the divisions of the beat) to give a sense of rollicking motion. With their many similarities, the composer has given us one Prelude and Fugue that sets a serious yet colorful tone and another that uses flair to energize the listener, which, in our context, are those going out into the world refreshed and renewed.




